August 8th - Virtual Unveiling of Alex Haley Historic Marker - 11am

The Alex Haley Memorial Project, in collaboration with The History Center in Tompkins County, will live stream a ceremony to honor Ithaca-born Alex Haley. Alex Haley is a celebrated author, best known for his 1967 book Roots: The Saga of an American Family, and The Autobiography of Malcolm X. The ceremony will unveil a historic place sign on Cascadilla Street marking the house where he was born. The ceremony will include thoughts from members of the Alex Haley Memorial Project, the Legacy Foundation which provided funding for the sign, The History Center in Tompkins County, and local representatives. Due to an abundance of caution, interested audiences are encouraged to participate through a livestream on The History Center's Facebook page. A sign language interpreter will be present to ensure equal access to the livestream.

August 23rd - Print-A-Kitty Youth Program 10am-12pm or 1pm-3pm



Exhibit Hall is Re-Opening to the Public on August 13th!

We are excited to announce that the Exhibit Hall is re-opening to the public on Thursday August

13th! We have been hard at work developing our re-opening and safety plans which can be read **here**.

We will be accepting visitors on a scheduled basis (online scheduling will become available next week) - Visits may be scheduled on our new website and will last 45 minutes. This system was developed to ensure that all visitors can feel secure in the Exhibit Hall with just their planned group. Staff will sanitize all touched surfaces in the museum between visitor groups. Masks must be worn at all times while inside the Tompkins Center for History & Culture, and we have sanitation stations located at the entrance and exits to the museum.



At this time the Exhibit Hall is the only location on the first floor that is re-opening. The **CAP ArtSpace and the the Downtown Visitors Center will remain closed**to the public for the time being, and there is no public access to bathrooms or the upper floors. **Visits to the Research Library must be scheduled separately by contacting Donna at archives@thehistorycenter.net**.

New Archival Collections Continue to Grow

2020 has been a tumultuous year.

In March we reached out to the Tompkins County community asking for donations telling us what life has been like under these strange and frightening new circumstances of the COVID-19 pandemic. People from all over have responded generously with pictures, essays, poems, videos and more.

It is critical for us to chronicle major historical turning points when we can, so documenting history in the making like the COVID pandemic is an ongoing thing. That's why we reached out a second time when Black Americans and their allies of all races reacted with frustration and fury after George Floyd was killed by police in Minneapolis in May. Protests have taken place worldwide, and here in Tompkins County activists have responded to our request, donating generously to help us document the lives and concerns of Black and Brown residents.



Archival collections often chronicle histories that are long past. Once in a rare while archivists can capture history in real time, and we are more grateful than we can say to the community members who have sent, and are continuing to send us things that catalog this transformative period. Please feel free to continue to send us your stories in these difficult times. They will become the first chapter in the history of this unbelievable year.

Stories from Inside


A collection of stories and images captured by the Tompkins County residents during the COVID-19 pandemic

This book will be available for purchase (\$19.95) at our Exhibit Hall during our open hours beginning August 13th.


Walk This Play - Self-Guided Theatrical Experiences
