There's Your Ready Girl - Screening & Panel

Nearly 40 people joined us on Zoom for "There's Your Ready Girl: Screening & Discussion" on April 14th. The recording of the event is now available on The History Center's YouTube Channel.

Dorothy Cotton was a bold, highly effective and important civil rights leader, the only woman on Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.'s Executive Staff, she lead the Citizenship Education Program for eight years. Dr. Cotton lived in Ithaca from the 1980's until her death in 2018.

The History Center in Tompkins County Announces New Exhibit: Breaking Barriers: Women's Lives & Livelihoods

Ithaca, NY - The History Center in Tompkins County (THC) is excited to announce its new exhibit "Breaking Barriers: Women's Lives & Livelihoods" will open July 2nd 2021. This exhibit has multiple

components: a temporary (July 2021-February 2022) physical display of six interactive exhibits at The History Center Exhibit Hall on the Ithaca Commons, selected virtual exhibits available at thehistorycenter.net/virtual-exhibits, and public access to selected interviews from the Women's Voices in Tompkins County: Oral History Collection. The physical and virtual exhibits will open to the public on Friday, July 2nd following two weeks of closure in the museum (June 13th-31st) for the installation of the new displays. Due to COVID-19 we are limiting the number of visitors in the museum and encourage guests to make reservations in advance at thehistorycenter.net/schedule.

"Women continue to break ceilings and have continuously increased representation across communities. While we appreciate the obstacles they have overcome and the achievements women have made, it is important to look back and explore the stories of those women who have been overlooked. Breaking Barriers: Women's Lives & Livelihoods explores the lives of women in public and private spheres across the centuries through six interactive exhibits: Haudenosaunee Influence on Women's Rights (Matilda Joslyn Gage Foundation), The Overlooked History of Women Working (HistoryForge), Serial Style (Wharton Studio Museum and Cornell Fashion + Textile Collection), Women's Social Clubs and Organizations, and Overcoming Barriers to Vote: Woman Suffrage Movement in Tompkins County. These exhibits will connect visitors with the rich and varied lives of women in Tompkins County through exploring the stories, artifacts, and community legacies they left behind.

The Breaking Barriers exhibit is presented and made possible by Chloe Capital. Despite recent progress, less than 2% of female funders receive venture capital investment. Chloe Capital is investing in the next generation of women entrepreneurs and innovators across the United States. About The History Center in Tompkins County

The History Center in Tompkins County (THC) is a generation-to-generation education and research center focused on engaging the public with the history of Tompkins County (located in the ancestral and contemporary lands of the Gayogohó:nọ' Nation) and the Finger Lakes region. THC helps people use the tools of history to understand the past, gain perspective on the present, and play an informed role in shaping the future. The History Center is located within the Tompkins Center for History & Culture, a collaborative visitor center and event space on the Ithaca Commons home to twelve independent non-profits and community organizations.

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New Tours Exploring Tompkins County History


Historic Ithaca staff created the <u>Historic Schools of Tompkins</u> <u>County Driving Tour</u> highlighting twelve historic school locations across Tompkins County, with historic images from The History Center photograph collection.



In collaboration with <u>Ithaca Murals</u>, History Center staff and volunteers spent much of the fall researching and writing accompanying histories for nearly twenty public murals in Tompkins County with the <u>History & Art Downtown Walking Tour</u>, and the <u>History & Art Driving Tour</u>.

Ithaca Murals has spent over a decade encouraging and creating artist opportunities in public spaces to tell stories of the diverse people who live in the community, prioritizing the leadership of artists of color, artists with jail experience, low income & working class artists, women, youth, the LGBTQAI+ community, and other artists of traditionally marginalized identity groups. Our research for these murals included delving into the history of Karen refugee communities in Tompkins County, Toni Morrison's experience as a student and later professor here, histories of industry in the West End, and highlighting two Haudenosaunee murals downtown, one of which is being torn down in the coming weeks as part of the Green St. Parking Garage renovation. The breadth of this project was huge and many of the stories behind the art were sparsely documented in the public record. We only just scratched the surface of public art in our community that touches on local history (of the twenty murals we highlighted, another 40 with history themes were identified), and we look forward to expanding efforts to document the history explored in our community's public art in the future.

Ithaca Murals is currently fundraising for a rejuvenation and reawakening of the <u>Underground</u>
<u>Railroad Mural</u> on Green Street, we encourage everyone to donate to support their effort to highlight
Black history and Black community artists here.

<u>History Center Highlighted in Podcast Series: Amended in Action (WRVO Oswego)</u>





Tompkins County Genealogy Family File Listing Online



Over the winter we had our volunteers spend some time creating a digital list of all the family files available in our collections. This list is now available to search on our website at The History Center in Tompkins County - Genealogy Family Files (thehistorycenter.net/Genealogy-Files).

This was a big change for us from having visitors come in person to look through our printed binders for family names, but a needed advancement as more family researchers connected with us online about tracking their family lineage through our collections. The actual files can still only be accessed in our Research Library, but we're excited to keep

getting more of our <u>Archival Finding Aids</u> online to improve access and understanding of our collections.

Writes Van Clief-Stefanon, "Meandering these streets, one might happen upon a landmark site or a name easily recognized. But how many stories go untold? Which ones have slipped into gaps in history? What place do such silences hold in shaping a community?" Lyrae Van Clief-Stefanon used The History Center's <u>archival resources</u> to inform her work on this significant part of our history.

Trap Door will be the Cherry's third headphone walking play, a form perfect for social distancing. Combining text, dialogue, music, and sound design to create an unforgettable theatrical experience on foot with downtown Ithaca as its backdrop, Trap Door will break open the form in new and exciting ways.

Finger Lakes - National Heritage Area Feasibility Study

Public Comment until June 1st



The National Park Service is conducting a study to determine the feasibility of designating the Finger Lakes region of New York as a National Heritage Area (NHA). This website is intended to familiarize the public with the feasibility study process and share what the study team has learned about this special place. As you scroll through these pages, please consider what you value about the Finger Lakes region and how it is a unique place within the cultural and historic fabric of the United States of America. The National Park Service study team needs your help to better understand the cultural heritage of the Finger Lakes and needs your opinions on the appropriateness of designating and managing a National Heritage Area if it is created.

This is a hugely exciting opportunity for our region, and if passed would have long lasting impacts in 14 counties, and for hundreds of cultural and historical institutions like The History Center in Tompkins County and Historic Ithaca. The National Park Service is offering a public comment period through June 1st, and we'd like to encourage all members of the public to take some time in the next six weeks to submit a public comment on why the history and heritage of our region deserves to be highlighted and preserved.
