Exhibit Hall for Visitors on the Autism Spectrum pg. 1

Today we are going to The History Center in Tompkins County. Inside the museum there are artifacts from all over Tompkins County. Some of the artifacts are hundreds of years old, while others could be from last year.

The museum is open every week and we can stay as long as we want to during open hours. You can bring any devices or tools that help you get around, communicate with others, or stay grounded. There are also no rules about sound in the museum, you can be as loud as you want while you explore.

The museum also welcomes service and support animals. Service animals must remain on a leash.







When we first arrive at the museum, we will be on the busy, and sometimes loud, Ithaca Commons. There will be two glass doors with big windows. Above the door in white letters are the words, "Tompkins Center for History & Culture."

When we enter, we will arrive inside the atrium. This room has a lot of light, and is usually quiet. There will be an exhibit in the exhibit tower in the center of the atrium. This exhibit changes multiple times a year.



To the left of the atrium is the Community Arts Partnership (CAP) ArtSpace Gallery. This room has a different art exhibit every month. The room looks dark from far away, but when you walk inside the lights will turn on. Most events happen in this room.



To get to The History Center Exhibit Hall from the Atrium, we will walk straight from the Ithaca Commons front doors into the Exhibit Hall through another set of open glass doors.


Here we will be greeted by people at the front desk, wearing blue nametags. They will ask questions like, "How are you today?", and "Where are you visiting from?" We can ask these people questions about the museum and the items on display. We can also hang up our coats and put our bags down while we visit.

If we are carrying drinks or food, the people at the front desk will ask us to leave these items at the front desk. Drinks and food are not allowed inside the Exhibit Hall, since a spill could damage the displays. We can pick up our drinks and food when we leave.

We can walk freely throughout the Exhibit Hall, look at all the items inside the glass tower displays, and scroll through the touch screens. We aren't allowed to touch most items on display. If we are allowed to touch an exhibit a sign will tell us its okay. Ask the staff at the front desk if you aren't sure what you can touch.



The History Center Exhibit Hall is entirely on the first floor. We can walk through the Passage Through Time Tunnel, explore the miniature Eight Square Schoolhouse, and check out the Tommy Plane exhibit.







Inside Passage Through Time Tunnel


When we exit the Passage Through Time exhibit we will arrive at the Children's Education Area. There are books, coloring sheets, a cash register, chalk boards, and other toys here. We can play with, move, and touch anything in this area. We can play with these materials during our visit, but must put them back on the shelf before we leave the museum.







Eight Square Schoolhouse Replica - Children's Education Area

Some touch screens may have videos or make noise. I or my family can look at thehistorycenter.net/accessibility to find out which cases make sounds before our visit.





Throughout our visit there will be noise (speaking and singing in English and Cayuga) in the Exhibit Hall coming from the Gayogohó:no? Creation Story video located at the Passage Through Time exhibit entrance. This video plays on a loop and the sounds and images will repeat throughout my visit.



We can also contact the museum staff before our visit to request this sound be turned off during our visit.





Another space with sound is the Story Vault. This is a small room where you can listen to audio clips from the oral history collections. These are interview clips where people talk about their lives and experiences in Tompkins County.

The Tommy Plane is one of the largest item in The History Center's collections. This Thomas Morse S4-B Scout, nicknamed "Tommy" was originally built in 1918 in Ithaca NY by the Thomas Morse Aviation Corporation. The plane was restored by the Ithaca Aviation Heritage Foundation over 14 years and flew in 2018.





We can walk all around the Tommy Plane, but should not touch the wings or propeller. The History Center hosts regular programs about the history of Tommy each year. We can learn more about the plane at www.thehistorycenter.net/tommy.
