## **BREAKING BARRIERS: Women's Lives & Livelihoods**

#### On display July 2021 - February 2022 at The History Center

Breaking Barriers: Women's Lives & Livelihoods explores the lives of women in public and private spheres across the centuries through six interactive exhibits at our Exhibit Hall on the Ithaca Commons. Featuring historic items from The History Center archival and object collections, and artifacts on loan from collaborating organizations.

In addition to our in-person exhibits, we've created two women's history virtual exhibits that are available for free on our website.

# 'Women's Voices in Tompkins County Oral History Collection' Now Available in Research Library & Story Vault



The History Center is thrilled to announce as part of the Breaking Barriers: Women's Lives & Livelihoods exhibit, through support from the Institute of Museum and Library Services two-year Building Capacity grant, the creation of a new ongoing collection "Women's Voices in Tompkins County." This collection includes over 60 oral history interviews with women in our community. These interviews were recorded from 2008 to 2020 and include the voices of: Jackie Melton Scott, Anna Kelles, Mimi Melegrito, Nancy Bereano,

Katherine Karakantas, Yen Ospina, Martha Preston, Leslyn McBean Clairborne, Amy Somchanhmavong, Dr. Nia Nunn, Cory Foster, Elaan Greenfield, and many more phenomenal movers, shakers, thinkers, and creators of Tompkins County.

Audio files and transcripts of the recordings are available in our Research Library by appointment, and selected clips have been added to the Story Vault exhibit in the museum. We look forward to continuing to add to this collection over the years.

# Serial Style: The Business of Being Irene Castle

Serial Style: The Business of Being Irene Castle explores Castle's participation in silent film production, fashion industry endeavors, and philanthropy in Tompkins County through a collaborative exhibit between the Wharton Studio Museum, Cornell Fashion + Textile Collection, and the Rare and Manuscript Collections at the Cornell University Library. For the first time ever, Castle's personal photo albums - including movie industry snapshots and photos she took of her everyday life in Ithaca - will be displayed alongside extant



examples of dresses from her eponymous fashion line, Irene Castle Corticelli Fashions.


Many of these artifacts will be shown against the backdrop of a large, breathtaking portrait of Irene Castle, which was painted around the year 1920 by Professor Olaf Brauner, a Cornell faculty member who was the head of the Department of Fine Arts in the College of Architecture, Art, and Planning from 1896 to 1939. Castle was an ingenious businesswoman, compelling silent film actress, and advocate for animal rights. *Serial Style: The Business of Being Irene Castle*celebrates the unique ways she broke barriers for women in film, fashion, and philanthropy during the heyday of the Wharton's moving picture production in Ithaca.

Overcoming Barriers to Vote: Woman Suffrage
Movement in Tompkins County - One Hundred +1
Years in the Making traces the timeline of the Woman
Suffrage Movement in the United States, highlighting
the numerous women who broke barriers in politics
and worked for the right to vote in New York State and
across the nation. The exhibit features Tompkins
County residents and organizations, from the
Haudenosaunee women who have long been political
leaders in their communities to the founders and
members of various clubs in Tompkins County
advocating for suffrage, temperance, women's issues,
and many other reforms in the 19th and early 20th
century.



# <u>Virtual Exhibit - Sisters of Change - Unsung Sheroes for Racial</u> <u>Justice Whose Names Everyone Should Know</u>

The <u>Dorothy Cotton Institute</u> in collaboration with The History Center has created a virtual exhibit and learning curriculum from the physical exhibit "<u>Sisters of Change Unsung Sheroes Whose Names Everyone Should Know</u>" which was on display at the Tompkins Center for History & Culture from January 2020 to June 2021. This exhibit explores the life of the late Dr. Dorothy Cotton, and twenty-five women of the movement for Civil Rights and women's rights, whose tremendous contributions deserve a prominent place in American history.




