### History Center Joins Museums for All and Blue Star Museum Initiatives

As part of our ongoing efforts to engage and connect with more members of our community, and attract visitors from out of town to learn about the history of Tompkins County, we're very excited to announce that we've been accepted as members of two ongoing national museum initiatives.

<u>Museums for All</u> is a national program that offers free or reduced admission to all families and individuals receiving food assistance (SNAP benefits) to more than 600 museums across the United States. Admission to The History Center will remain free and open to the general public as well, but as part of our commitment to accessibility through this initiative, we will be offering free and reduced cost access options to our events, and other programs to all EBT card holders. Details on how to sign up for reduced cost programs will be listed in

Blue Star Museums is an annual collaboration between the National Endowment for the Arts, Blue Star Families, the Department of Defense, and over 2,000 museums across America to offer free admission to the nation's active duty military personnel including National Guard and Reserve and their families each summer. The program begins on Armed Forces Day in mid-May and ends on Labor Day at the beginning of September. We will be highlighting materials and information from our archives about the history of the Tommy Plane in WWI, Tompkins County women and their service and experience during wartimes, local members of the United States Colored Troops in the Civil War, and Veterans Memorial sites across the county throughout the summer as part of this program.



# Forest Home Improvement Association Adds New Historic Writings to Website

#### From the <u>Forest Home Improvement</u> <u>Association</u> (FHIA):

A recent newsletter from the History Center announces a guide for a "<u>driving tour</u>" to look at historic schools in Tompkins County. It includes the former Forest Home School at 100 Judd Falls Road. The school, which was built in 1921 and closed in 1964, is now the Lewis Building, used by Cornell Botanic Gardens as an administrative building. See pocketsights.com/tours/place/Forest-

Inspired by this resource, some additions have been made to the FHIA website, to make available various short pieces written by Martha Warren Hertel (1915-2004), who was born in Forest Home and lived here most of her life. One piece she wrote is at School Life as a Fourth Grader about 1925. According to Lucy Hertel Staley, Martha's daughter, this was written around 1992 at the request of a girl who was then in 4th grade and a neighbor of Martha's on Crest Lane. Thanks go to Lucy for transcribing Martha's notes and handouts. Find them at fhia.org/martha-warren-hertel-miscellaneous-writings. More will be added over time.

Land originally part of the farm that Martha grew up on was sold off at various times to add houses to the neighborhood. Soon after her parents bought the "white farmhouse at the top of the hill" (now 127 Warren Road) in 1907, land was sold for the first house on Halcyon Hill. Martha's mother (Mary W. Warren) planned the lots for Crest Lane in 1949 and moved there herself when Martha and her husband, John Hertel, bought the white farmhouse. Later, land that was part of the farm became Fairway Drive after Martha and John built 130 Crest Lane and moved there, selling the farm house and land to Lawrence "Larry" Fabbroni Sr. in 1978.

## History Center Joins 'Museums for All' Initiative

Ithaca NY - The History Center in Tompkins County has joined Museums for All, a signature access program of the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS), administered by the Association of Children's Museums (ACM), to encourage people of all backgrounds to visit museums regularly and build lifelong museumgoing habits. The program supports those receiving food assistance (SNAP) benefits visiting The History Center with free admission. Similar free and reduced admission is available to eligible members of the public at more than 500 museums across the country. Museums for All is part of The History Center in Tompkins County's broad commitment to seek, include, and welcome all audiences.



The Sciencenter and the Museum of the Earth are also Tompkins County participants in Museums for All. With three museums in Ithaca participating in Museums for All, our community has been named a Hub City in the Museums for All program. We are the 48th such Hub City overall, and the second in New York State after New York City.

*Museums for All* helps expand access to museums and also raise public awareness about how museums in the U.S. are reaching their entire communities. More than 500 institutions participate in the initiative, including art museums, children's museums, science centers, botanical gardens, zoos, history museums, and more. Participating museums are located nationwide, representing 48 states.



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# <u>\*NEW BOOK\* Levanna: Interpretation and</u> Controversy in New York Archaeology 1923-2018



#### About the Book

Levanna was a famous and well-visited archaeological site in central New York, along the eastern side of Cayuga Lake, during the Great Depression. It was primarily known for its spectacular animal effigies. But were they real or forgeries? Jack Rossen takes us on a journey through the 1920s and 1930s, the era of an outdoor museum, and professional attempts by the Society for American Archaeology (SAA) to suppress it.

The book takes us through the 2007-2009 re- excavation of Levanna and the related 2011-2014 excavations at the Myers Farm site. Along the way, Cayuga history is reinterpreted as more peaceful than previously believed, and the case is made for a Haudenosaunee (Iroquois) Confederacy more than one thousand years old. The work was conducted through the framework of indigenous collaborative archaeology with leaders of the Cayuga and Haudenosaunee Confederacy. The narrative approach includes stories of the contemporary people, both Native and non-Native, who protected the site, supported the research, and

provided ideas, wisdom, inspiration, and friendship.

#### About the Author

Jack Rossen received his PhD from the University of Kentucky. He was Professor of Anthropology and Co-Founder of Native American Studies at Ithaca College, Ithaca, NY and taught in the Master's Program in Heritage Management at the University of Hawai`i at Hilo. He began work on collaborative archaeology and community projects with the Cayuga and Onondaga

Nations in what is now central New York in 1998. He currently works with the non-profit History Flight in Kiribati, supervising excavations of MIA U.S. Servicemen from the Battle of Tarawa.

# MASK UPDATE

<u>Masks Still Required</u> at the Tompkins Center for History & Culture



The History Center in Tompkins County will continue to require all visitors to wear masks in accordance with the building policies of the **Tompkins Center for History & Culture**. Because our museum is in a shared building with 12 other local non-profits, and our visitors include families with young children who do not yet qualify for the vaccine, and visitors who may be medically ineligible for the vaccine, we will continue to require masks inside the building for the continued safety of all our visitors, volunteers, and staff. We will not be checking the vaccination status of visitors and appreciate the continued support of our community and out of town visitors in following our building guidelines by wearing their masks while visiting the museum.

We are grateful that our organization was able to re-open the Exhibit Hall in August of 2020, and has been open to the public for over 10 months with strict safety measures in place to ensure safe and worry free visits for everyone!
