New and Noteworthy

Family and Children's Service of Ithaca is the oldest human service agency in

Tompkins County. It was formed in 1958 by the merger of the Family Society of Ithaca and the Ithaca Children's Home. Initially a residence for orphaned or destitute children, the Ithaca Children's Home was founded in 1885, while the Family Society began life as the Associated Charities



of Ithaca in 1912. The combination of the two has served the community for decades, "dedicated to supporting, promoting, and strengthening the well-being of individuals and families by providing high-quality, accessible mental health care and related social services, with a particular sensitivity toward the needs of children."

In 2010 we received a generous donation of materials celebrating the history of this noteworthy organization, including scrapbooks, business and financial records, trustee meeting minutes, brochures, and historical materials. We were delighted that this important collection was enhanced a few weeks ago with a donation of photographs of children and activities from the 1940s. These images, some taken by noted Ithaca photographer Curt Forester, are a welcome addition, offering engaging glimpses of the children who were served in generations past.
