Did you know that the 'Apple Harvest Festival' in Ithaca dates back to 1982? Whereas the moniker of 'Apple Fest' has been used for a annual Brooktondale celebration since 1963, and Groton held the popular Cider Fest during the 1980s. Uniquely through Cornell's College of Agriculture and Life Sciences, Tompkins County has been <u>the birthplace of more</u> <u>than 69 apple varieties since 1880</u>.

We plan on featuring loaned items in our Exhibit Hall during <u>A Sporting Chance</u>. So, bring us your well-worn shirt from your beer league softball team, the hats you made for your children's youth rec team, or the trophy from your pine box derby championship; We can't wait to build a broad and diverse display of what it means to "sport" here in Tompkins County.

This history is an important part of the fabric of our community. Local teams at all levels bring people together, build relationships across differences, and promote a sense of pride and spirit. By documenting the history of these teams, we gain a better understanding of our community over time, and the contributions of the many people past and present who were part of these teams.

In addition to our community wall, the exhibit will also feature in-depth explorations of a number of local teams. Guest contributors, exhibits on loan, and interactive displays will augment the rich <u>artifacts and photographs</u> from The History Center's collection. Highlights from the Collection

This is the first of an occasional series featuring interesting parts of <u>The History</u> <u>Center's archival collections</u>.

A recent visitor to our <u>Research Library</u> writes for <u>The Restorer Magazine</u>, the award-winning publication of the Model A Ford Club of America. He was searching for images of Model A cars in our photograph collections, and asked for any sources, however unlikely, that might have cars and trucks, even in an ancillary place in the image. That request led us to a surprising gold mine for him: Our Ithaca City Water Department photographs. Several years ago a representative of the Water Department generously donated a CD full of hundreds of digital images of Water Department initiatives, construction projects, workplaces, and of course, vehicles. Our researcher found several that would be well suited for his articles and he went away happy with an email full of digital trucks.



The <u>Ithaca</u> <u>City Water</u> <u>Department</u> <u>photographs</u> cover myriad aspects of the department's work, and this collection is a vivid reminder of how much

critical infrastructure permeates our lives and communities, as well as of the workers who made it all possible. These include dams and bridges, pipes and culverts, pumphouses, and so much more that enables a modern city to function in a healthy and safe way. But this collection contains more



than just the visible evidence of essential infrastructure: It also highlights in beautiful detail the many bodies of water that permeate Tompkins County, including Cayuga Lake and our many creeks. These critical water sources offer a gorgeous natural counterpoint to the utilitarian photos of everyday structures.
