Millicent Clarke-Maynard* (38 minutes)

Millicent Clarke-Maynard discusses coming to Ithaca after graduate school in 1979 to teach in the Ithaca City School District at the encouragement of Beverly J. Martin, who was the district's Affirmative Action Intercultural Relations Officer at the time. She reflects on the relationships she has built in Ithaca, especially in Club Essence and the Southside neighborhood; her experiences as a teacher; and her involvement in the Ithaca community, through many different activities and facets of community service.

Barry Derfel* (45 minutes)

Barry Derfel discusses his background in New Jersey, degrees in teaching and school administration, and the importance of equity and anti-racist work in his life and career. He also speaks on the importance of understanding oppressive institutions and intersectionality and empowering communities through education.

Kirby Edmonds* (44 minutes)

Kirby Edmonds discusses what he believes are the two most important issues facing us today, global climate change and income inequality, which threaten survival and peace in interrelated ways. He also speaks to his views on the institutions that uphold conflict and violence and the role of empathy in addressing these issues. Relating these ideas to his work, Kirby Edmonds describes his projects, including the Dorothy Cotton Institute, the Building Bridges Initiative, and Cradle to Career.

Sachem Sam George (Cayuga Nation, Bear Clan)* (39 minutes)

Sachem Sam George discusses growing up on Seneca territory, becoming aware of his connection to the Cayuga people, and the process of taking on a role of leadership within the Cayuga community. He reflects on the struggles that the Cayuga people have recently faced, his experience learning the Cayuga language, and his hopes for cooperation between the Cayuga Nation and other communities groups in the region.

June Morse (51 minutes)*

June Morse discusses her youth in England during WWII, career teaching in England, Germany, and Syracuse, and moving to New York with her husband to settle in Ithaca. She also discusses her impressions of class differences in England and the United States, Ithaca's development as a city, and Cornell's contribution to Ithaca culture.

Poppy Singer* (41 minutes)

(10/18/2018) Poppy Singer discusses her life experiences, including living in Israel with her former husband at age 21, homeschooling her children, and working in art and food production throughout her life. She also discusses her

perception of Ithaca, particularly the changes that have been made to the downtown area and the malls. Finally, she speaks about her interest in alternative education and environmentalism.

(11/8/2018) Poppy Singer reflects on her experience attending East Hill School, which was a free (alternative) elementary school between 1969 and 1977, and the positive memories it left her with. After high school, she worked as a graphic designer and helped organize Ithaca's first Take Back the Night march, a protest against violence against women, before spontaneously moving to Israel, where she lived briefly with her former husband.

After graduating from Cornell University with degrees in English and Science Education, John Wertis worked as an assistant archivist at Cornell, science teacher, school principal, cemetery superintendent, and Historian for the Town of Ulysses. He discusses his experience in Tompkins County, having lived in Ithaca, Trumansburg, Ulysses, Newfield, and Enfield at different times in his life, and his family, including his four children and partner.
